MIBFN Announces Newest Breastfeeding Advocacy Campaign

Encourages Promotion, Protection, and Support of Breastfeeding in the Child Care Setting

Lansing, MI: The Michigan Breastfeeding Network (MIBFN) introduces its newest advocacy campaign in support of systems-level change, the “Breastfeeding and Child Care,” which provides tools for early child education providers, information for families seeking quality care, and resources for breastfeeding advocates at www.mibbreastfeeding.org/. The Toolkit is the latest MIBFN campaign to address systemic barriers that deter breastfeeding initiation and interfere with breastfeeding duration and success. To reach the widest audience possible, the Child Care Toolkit is available in Arabic, Burmese, English, Japanese, and Spanish.

In 2017, 58.1 percent of mothers with children under the age of one and 64.2 percent of mothers with children under the age of six were employed (Bureau of Labor Statistics). Due to the growing number of mothers in today’s workforce, many children from birth to age four are regularly cared for by someone other than a parent. In Michigan, there are over 77,000 working mothers with infants under one year of age and 443,00 children under the age of six potentially in need of child care. With so many Michigan children in need of child care, quality programs set the foundation for success in school, work, and life. In terms of types of available child care, there are 4,419 center-based child care programs and 4,925 family child care (FCC) homes. At present, a quality recognition program such as a breastfeeding-friendly designation does not exist. Care providers influence the lives and health of the families they serve and can be an important source of support for working mothers who want to breastfeed. Supportive child care is essential for breastfeeding mothers and providers play a vital role in the success of employed mothers who breastfeed. Implementing a breastfeeding-friendly action plan should be the goal of every program across the state of Michigan. Breastfeeding normalization and support efforts at this level of society catalyze change for all families regardless of structure, socioeconomic status, race, or ethnicity.

The “Breastfeeding and Child Care Toolkit” is a compendium of useful tools made up of five components: 1) A platform for sharing breastfeeding and child care success stories; 2) A sample breastfeeding-friendly policy for adoption in early child education programs; 3) A template “We Believe” poster for supporting breastfeeding within the child care setting; 4) The MIBFN System Changer’s Guide to Breastfeeding and Child Care for breastfeeding advocates; and 5) The MIBFN Position Paper in support of breastfeeding in the child care setting for policy makers. The “Breastfeeding and Child Care Toolkit” details the importance of supporting breastfeeding in the child care setting and encourages education and training for all child care staff.
